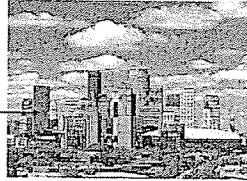
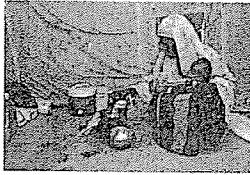

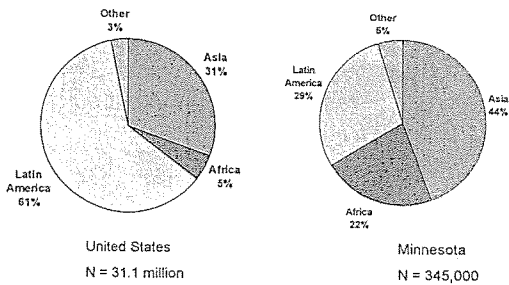
Immigrants United States and Minnesota, 2008

- o United States: 37,960,935
(12.5%) were foreign-born
in the USA
- o Minnesota: 340,657
(6.5%) were foreign born
in Minnesota
 - increase of 5.3% since
2000



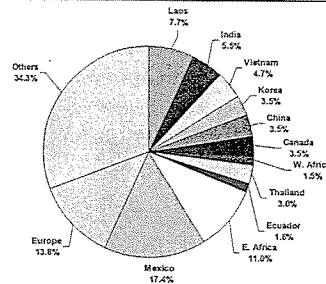

came as refugees



What does it mean to be a refugee?

Foreign-born resident who:

- ☒ is not a United States citizen
- ☒ cannot return to his or her country of origin
because of a well-founded fear of persecution due
to race, religion, nationality, political opinion, or
membership in a particular social group

Refugee status is generally given:

- ☒ prior to entering the United States
- ☒ by the State Department or U.S Citizenship and
Immigration Services (USCIS)

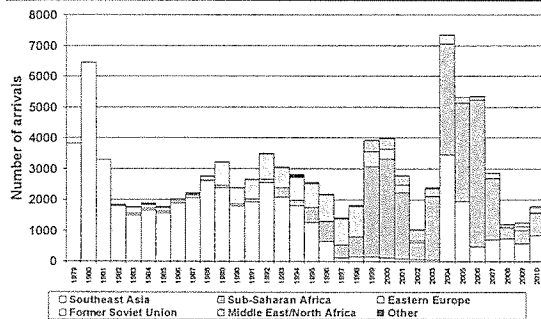

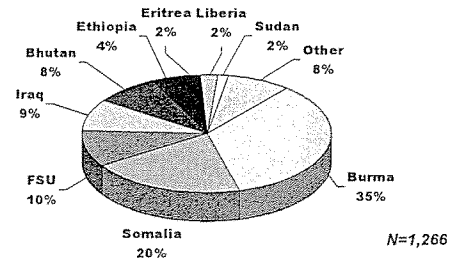

Primary Refugee Arrivals Minnesota, 2009

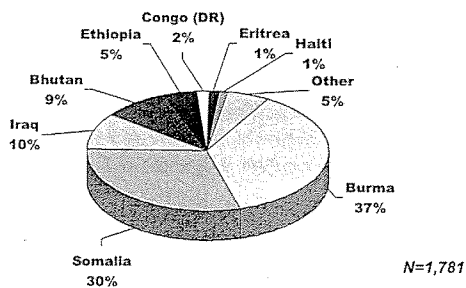

Primary Refugee Arrivals Minnesota, 1/1/2010 - 9/15/2010

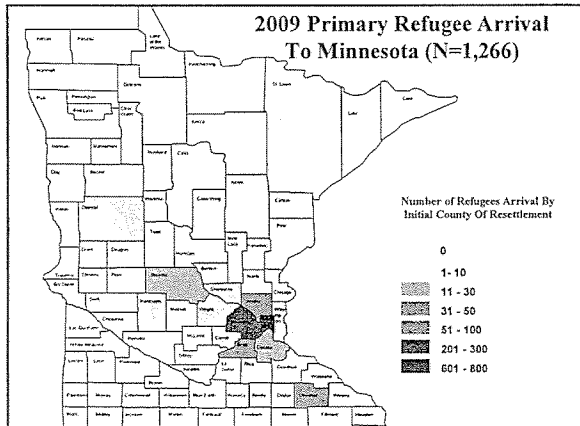

2009 Primary Refugee Arrival To Minnesota (N=1,266)



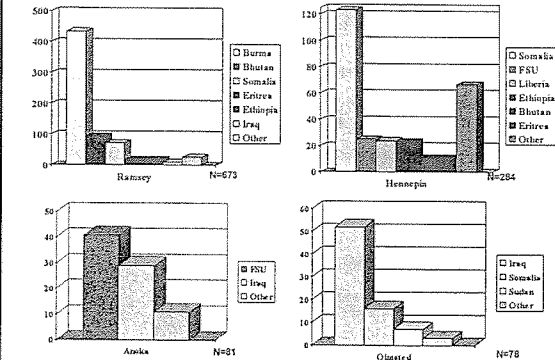

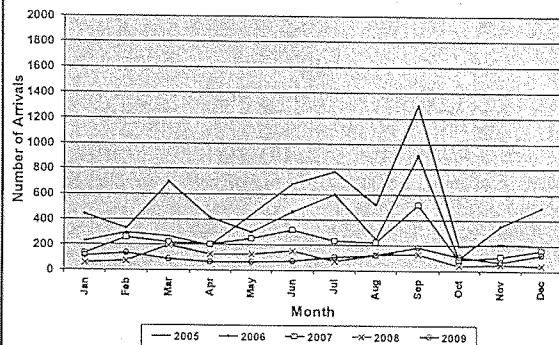

Primary Refugee Arrival by Month Minnesota, 2005-2009

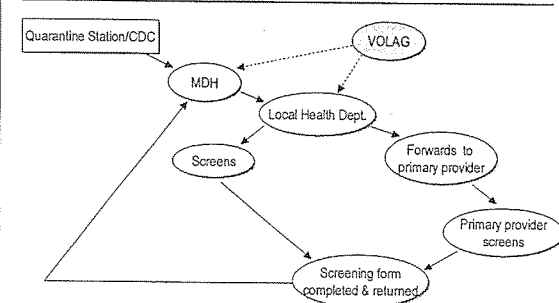

Refugee Health Screening in MN

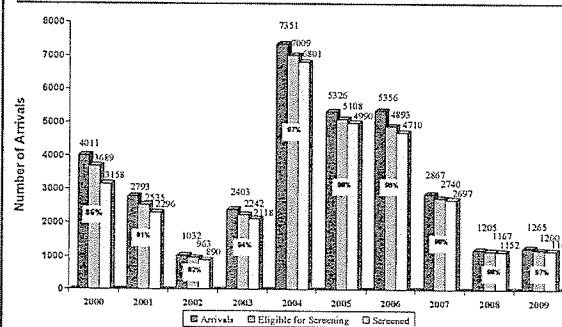
- Exam w/in the first 90 days of arrival
- Public health clinics and private providers
- Goal:
 - ...to control communicable disease among, and resulting from, the arrival of new refugees through:
 - ❖ health assessment
 - ❖ treatment
 - ❖ referral

Health Status of New Refugees Upon Arrival, Ramsey, 2009-10*	
• Screening Rate	70% of all eligible refugees screened to date
• Immunizations (Overseas / Domestic Screening)	90% with overseas vaccines / 88% started/continued vaccinations
• Tuberculosis Infection (Diagnosis of LTBI or Suspect/Active TB disease)

Sub-Saharan Africans (Eritrean/Ethiopian/Somali)	48%
S/SE Asians (Burmese/Bhutanese)	25%
Middle Eastern (Iraqis)	7%
• Hepatitis B Infection (HBsAG positive)

Health Status of New Refugees Upon Arrival Ramsey, 2009-10*,Cont'd	
• Parasitic Infection (at least one type of pathogenic parasite)**	
All refugees	27% (Strongyloides, Giardia, Trichuris, E. Histolytica)
Sub-Saharan Africans	25% (Giardia, Strongyloides)
S/SE Asians	35% (Strongyloides, Giardia, Trichuris, Hookworm, Ascaris)
• Lead Level (≥ 10 ug/dl, < 6 years of age)	
All refugees	1%
Sub-Saharan Africans (Eritrean/Ethiopian/Somali)	0%
S/SE Asians (Burmese/Bhutanese)	2%
• Hemoglobin (< 12 gm/dl)	
All refugees	23%
Sub-Saharan Africans (Eritrean/Ethiopian/Somali)	27%
S/SE Asians (Burmese/Bhutanese)	23%
